Part 2 The Storm of Lake Townsend Keith Smoot, Cruise Director

Knowing how quickly waves can build on Lake Townsend, I watched with some trepidation as Rudy and Jeff set out on that afternoon. As the sky darkened, I readied my 45 ft. Snark to put to sea. When the seas exceeded ten feet, I was concerned about putting my Styrofoam boat in that weather, but I also knew Rudy and Jeff's machismo would not allow them to seek a safe harbour. I set out to find them.

I knew something was wrong when I spotted the Snipe. Even at a distance of five miles, I could tell the boat wasn't being handled properly. In a few moments, I could tell the boat held only one person. Knowing how difficult a boat-to-boat rescue would be I told Rudy to jump overboard and swim to my boarding ladder. We could concentrate on finding Jeff with Rudy on my boat.

After crisscrossing Lake Townsend's twenty foot seas for three days, we came across Rudy's Snipe, Tax Break with Jeff inside! The storm had reunited man and boat, so Jeff simply went below and closed the hatch on the Snipe to ride out the storm. With the winds and seas subsiding, Rudy boarded his boat to return to the Lake Townsend Marina with Jeff.

Since my Snark was well provisioned. I used the clearing weather to sail to Bath, the home of Blackbeard the Pirate. I knew Lewis Johnson was in Bath studying Blackbeard's sailing and piracy techniques in his role as Education Chairman for LTYC. When I found him, he was walking the decks of a 60 ft. square-rigger wearing a tricorn hat, and he appeared to be stumping around on a peg leg! When my boat approached to $\frac{1}{4}$ mile, a puff of white smoke from the side of the square-rigger made my heart sink. I heard the cannon's roar seconds before the ball smashed into my boat. Fortunately, Styrofoam floats, so both pieces of the Snark held me up. I waited rescue, or worse, capture by the pirates. I only hoped my good friend, Captain Jolly Johnson, would recognize his old friend.

CRUISING NEWS

Wanda and I had a short but bumpy trip during the Lake Norman Cruise. We started the trip with a compliment from a gentleman and his wife who complimented us on the smooth job we did of launching Gwaihir. If he had stayed around a little longer, he would have been able to watch us sail our engineless sloop away from the dock and into Brown's Bay. Truth be told, the wind had us on a beam reach, so leaving and then turning left onto close hauled port tack was a snap.

The wind held nicely as we searched for a spot to settle for the night. Not wanting to be on a lee shore on our favorite island, we went around to the other side. The bottom was steep and holding slippery, so we sailed back to the lee side. On the way we passed a small spit of land blocking most of the wind and wave. We stopped there, eventually setting two anchors. By now the quick and simple dinner Wanda always prepares for our first night was wonderful. The tropical rum/smoothie she was experimenting with didn't hurt either. When the huge powerboaters finally went to sleep, so did we.

After breakfast Wanda started walking in the water near the beach to another possible anchorage she had seen the previous day. The flukey headwinds made me sail two or three long tacks away from the island to reach the beach. I saw Wanda swimming out to me, so I did my best MOB recovery of a conscious victim. By then the beach was occupied so we continued sailing. Why were the tops of the floorboards wet? I had some water collected during the winter, but I THOUGHT I had it all out. Mop up the water. Wait a while, more water???? We beached the boat so I could empty and check the lazarette. Water was coming in spurts from the cockpit drain hose every time a powerboat wake rocked us, which was frequently. I dragged the stern onto the beach, removed the hose, and DUCT TAPE TO THE RESCUE !!!! Back in the water we decided to set two anchors against the predicted thunderstorms and cook dinner. Boy,

can Wanda plan a boating meal. Marinated steak, corn roasted on the charcoal grill and baked beans, with more of her rum smoothies for sundowners. The thunderstorms passed us with only a little rain.

We got an early start the next morning and sailed off the anchor and into the ramp area. Once again, due to the wind being on our starboard reach, we only had to paddle about two boat lengths at docking.

The LTYC Cruisers will travel to Washington, NC and shoot for Bath and perhaps Belhaven on a four day trip starting Thursday June 24th. The next trip will be to Oriental, NC; always a lovely, relaxing trip. Oriental has a nice NC Wildlife access ramp, as well as a small motel. If you want to daytrip or overnight on your boat, Oriental can accommodate you. Contact me at home or e-mail for directions and details.
