Commodore Steps Down

The Lake Townsend Yacht Club met at a Special Meeting on Saturday, September 2, 2006 to accept the resignation of Lew Johnson as Commodore. Lew had been Commodore and Acting Vice Commodore when he tendered his resignation. Lew stated that he would continue his membership and participation in the Club but he chose to step aside as an officer and Board member. Although Lew has been with the Club for only four years, he enthusiastically accepted nomination as the Rear Commodore for 2004 and served as Rear Commodore and this year as Commodore. After Esther Khoury's resignation as Vice Commodore, Lew assumed responsibility for the race management and equipment management duties as well. The Club thanks Lew for his service.

The Board and Club members who attended the September 2nd Board meeting discussed the state of the Club and the need to get more members involved in the month to month activities. The Board decided not to fill the Commodore and Vice Commodore positions for this year but to focus on recruiting a strong board for 2007.

Report from the Isotope Nationals

LAKE WACCAMAW, N.C. - Sixteen skippers arrived for the 30th Isotope Nationals, Aug. 26-27. Of those 16, three had participated in the first Nationals in 1977. Three others were arriving for their very first time. The forecast was promising, 6-8 knots, ideal Isotope sailing weather. Boats

started to arrive and set up Friday afternoon. A 1:30 competitors' meeting on Saturday allowed the late arrivals an 8:00 a.m. departure out of Raleigh and still arrive in time to setup. Steak dinner was planned for Saturday, and Sunday first signal was 8:30 a.m.

Howard Alexander, one of the original three, was PRO for the event, as he still did not have a main sail for his boat. Jack Hobbs and Valerie Nieman traveled down from Greensboro to support the Isotope fleet with RC services. Joleen Rasmussen took care of the registration, scoring, and protest committee. Gil Vick, David Sessoms, and Mike Cooper from Lake Waccamaw filled in RC with mark boat, signal boat, local expertise.

New to the Nationals this year is

- Glenn Howell, Raleigh, NC. Glenn has owned his Isotope for three years and uses it to practice fine tuning his racing techniques. Glenn also races an F-31, but finds that Isotope really gives his a chance to feel the effect of every adjustment and wind shift, and with an active fleet in the Raleigh area, Glenn can count on having 8-10 boats on the line.
- Matthew Harrell, Middlesex, NC. Matthew owns the boat with his father, Tommy. They race the boat along with other family members and neighbors on five other catamarans on Buckhorn Reservoir. Matthew is on the UNC Chapel Hill Sailing Team. The Harrells have owned the boat for so long, they can't recall how long.
- Patrick Duke, Holly Springs, NC. Patrick purchased his boat last year in partnership with his boss as a chance to sail a catamaran with his boys, Corbin (age 8) and JJ (age 5). Patrick has been making small adjustments to his boat, replacing the aluminum dolphin striker with one made of carbon fiber, changing the rudder lines to be inside the tube, just to clean up the appearances.

- o Corbin raced with his Dad, Patrick
- JJ raced with Joleen, and held the tiller going down wind in the three races on Saturday.
- When not on the water, the Isotope makes a great set of monkey bars for the boys

Other Interesting Facts

Alan Wolf's #007 sustained a major hole at the start of the third race on Saturday. Both Alan and Frank III (#927) were starting port, Frank III to windward of Alan. As Alan sheeted in to head up and clear the starboard starters, Frank III bore off to duck below Alan. Amazing how much speed an Isotope picks up as it bears off to duck. Frank nicely t-boned the center of Alan's hull. Alan and Frank III both headed to shore, Frank to offer Alan the use of Frank's boat for the rest of the regatta. What a wonderful offer, but not necessary. Race Committee filed for redress. Alan received the average of R1/R2 for the third race. With a bit of duct tape, Alan won the first race on Sunday and finished 5th overall in the Nationals.

A Sailing Adventure

The sailing vessel is a 1971 Morgan 27. She is called /Leona Jane,/ after my nieces. The first mate is Denice (she's just not quite as old as the boat). This four day journey began with an straight line, 85 mile, 16 hour, compass-guided, off shore cruise heading from Wilmington, NC to Cape Lookout, NC. Without landmarks, every few hours intentionally coming upon the occasional charted buoys reassured the crews' confidence in its novice navigational skills. A day exploring the desolate Outer Banks beaches rewarded us with many

wonderful discoveries--so much beautiful life at that place and the evidence of whatever it is that comes after that. The deceased creatures that we encountered on the beach include a loggerhead turtle and a sperm whale. The hours alone with the whale at the frontier of the salty wilderness inspired a contemplation of perspective, an awareness of my perceptions of opportunity and vulnerability. A being so strong and well-suited for life in the ocean ended up like this after a wrong turn, and I should dare to venture out over that same ocean on a piece of fiberglass? . . . sure!--I'm glad to know that feeling.

The return voyage, by way of a purposeful but leisurely day and a half on the Atlantic Intercoastal Waterway began after a much appreciated, seemingly overdue, professionally prepared lunch in the quaint seaside town of Beaufort, NC. We probably sailed half of the way and motored half of the way in alternating submissive compliances to the vacillating wind velocities. This leg showed us the famous wild ponies at the Core Banks, lots of dolphins. We took advantage of the chance for unnervingly close scrutiny of our tax dollars in action as the boys engaged in a bit long-range target practice at the Marine Corps' Camp Lejeune. We learned how to work North Carolina's system of drawbridges--they are on VHF radio channel 13, by the way.

But wait, there's good news: I didn't have to pack anything because I took my whole house with me, we spent less than \$100.00, as far as we know we only lost one hat and one corkscrew overboard, and we only ran aground twice the whole time.

I am grateful for the timeliness of these events as today is my 29th birthday; and because I'm often annoyed the cognizance that there is not much to show for these years, I take consolation in the realization that the stacks of journals and photo albums cannot be assigned a dollar value, and this is who I am, and that's the way it is.

Come go sailin' with me. Some of you I have been ignoring for far too long; let me know. Enough of this rambling--please enjoy the show.
