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Dave Ullman Selected as Special Guest Competitor at 2014 Championship of Champions

Imagine a regatta where every competitor is a current one-design class champion.

US Sailing's Championship of Champions is recognized as one of the more unique adult racing events in the country. All helmsmen have qualified for this event by winning a one-design class National, North American, or

World Championship in the over the past year. These skippers and their teams will race for the Jack Brown Trophy while representing their class. The competition will be challenging with many decorated sailors competing on the same course. The 2014 edition of this US Sailing classic is hosted by the Edgewater Yacht Club in Cleveland, Ohio on October 9-12.

Each year a guest helm is invited. Past guest helms have included Paul Cayard and Betsy Alison, and other sailing

luminaries. This year's guest competitor will be three-time 470 World Champion ('77, '78, '80) and 2007 Melges 24 World Champion Dave Ullman. He was also US Sailing's 1996 Rolex Yachtsman of the Year.

Ullman returns to the championship he won in 1980 (sailed in the 470). He also returns to Thistle sailing, which is one of several class national championships he has collected over the years.

"It's a strong event again, and when I got the invite, how could I say no," said Ullman. "This championship has a warm spot in my heart. You get to race against, and meet with, sailors you don't usually sail with. It's just fun to sail against all sorts of one-design champions."

"It's all about coming into this event from another class and sailing your best. It can be really interesting to see how it turns out and who comes out on top."

Inaugurated in 1976, US Sailing selects 19 onedesign class champions that have been nominated by their class associations to compete at the Championship of Champions. As one of US Sailing's most popular events, the championship is held in a different class each year, and

permanent residents.

• Applications are accepted from January through July.

Sailors who normally sail in the U.S. and are members of a club, class or association affiliated with US Sailing are eligible.

Applications are evaluated on three main criteria:

- 40% Sailor Criteria how many major events have they done in the past three years; number of races in national championship, number of attendants at national championship
- 20% Class Criteria size, diversity, depth and activity of class nationally
- 40% Other Sailor Athlete status, class membership in US Sailing, previous experience, demonstrated Corinthian spirit, etc.

The team of selectors researches each applicant's ability and background by examining regatta results, drawing on personal knowledge and researching the relative difficulty of the class championships. The Championship of Champions committee tries to get as many divergent classes as possible. Classes that have never proposed a champion to compete are encouraged to do so. In 2013, over 60% of the competitors had never sailed in the event before.

boats are supplied by the host club. Classes range from conventional to cutting edge and have included the Y-Flyer, Snipe, Hobie Cat, J-24, Sunfish, Etchell, Lightning to name just a few. Helmsmen and their crew will be tested in Thistles to see if they can hold their own.

The event has crowned champions ranging in age from

13 to over 70. Many competitors are amateur sailors and some are professionals. The Championship of Champions features singlehanded sailors and others who sail with up to five or six crew.

What makes this event unique is that all are top competitors and anyone can win.

WAYFARER MIDWINTERS IN FLORIDA

the weekend.

The promise of warm weather, ice free roads and perfect sailing winds like those on Garrison Keiller's Lake Wobegon, enticed five Wayfarer sailors from the Carolinas to hitch on their boats and head to Lake Eustis, FL for the Wayfarer Midwinter Championship Regatta. This is a three day regatta which is shared with MC Scows and usually has practice racing on Thursday and a guest speaker.

Three of the boats hail from Lake Townsend Yacht Club while the other two have sailed in the Mayor's Cup and HOT regattas.

AnnMarie Covington, W276, and Jim Heffernan, W1066, hit the US15/501 starting line early on Tuesday, January 28 to get far enough south of the freezing line before



sailing at Fort Desoto Park. The park is located on Mullet Key at the northern entrance of the huge Tampa Bay. We were able to beach our boats in front of our tents and easily set off to explore the tidal waters near the Gulf. After two days of sailing near Shell Key and testing the outer shoals protecting Bunces Pass, we got up the nerve to cross the bar and sail

to Egmont Key that guards the approach to Tampa Bay. A three to four foot swell from the Gulf was creating breaking waves along most of the bar. We wiggled thru a quiet area and when clear of the breaking waves turned south for the one hour sail to Egmont Key. The blinking lighthouse gave us a good reference and soon we were trying to land on the white sands near the lighthouse. This did not go well. The winds had just shifted and increased rapidly so we were now on a lee shore getting soaked and trying to protect our rudders. As we worked back into deep water it was agreed that we should start beating for home without trying another landing.

With a lovely beam wind we could nicely control our speed to navigate into the calmer waters and soon our campsites were in sight. With the boats safely anchored, and the skies turning nasty we were ready with wine glasses in hand as the wind blew hard and the tents tried to take flight.

Now we are back at the Lake Eustis Sailing Club preparing for the George Washington Birthday Regatta. This event will be well attended by many Flying Scots. Lake Townsend sailors should consider coming down next year for this event and some club racing before or after. I hear it is snowing in Greensboro today.

Winter "Racing" in North Carolina – Jan 11, 2014

How many times are you asked by a friend or co-worker – do you still sail during the winter? I am, all the time!

The weather is a bit more interesting during the winter. You can typically expect more wind during the winter and snow in addition to rain. You may even arrive at the lake to find it frozen nearly out to the dam. During January, it was like we had four seasons in one week.

What is a sailor to do? Layer up and show up! We will make the call at the lake. There's been many a time the forecast has been wrong, and the sailing been wonderful. There's been many a time the weather has been less than preferred, and the sailing still has been wonderful. Should the club decide not to race, the shore events will still make it a day well spent.

Even our recalcitrant weather watchers were pleased to have made it out to the lake Jan. 11. Wanda had a hot breakfast waiting for the participants. The forecast was for very heavy air. At 10:30, it wasn't the wind that called the day, but rather the rain and temperature. The group of 24 decided for heated class room events.

The topic d'jour was Starting Tactics. The group discussed

- Ways to detect the favored side of the course.
- Watch the prior start
- Know the wind type
 - Oscillating no favored side
 - Persistent sail the disfavored tack first
 - Lake Townsend Wind
- Sighting the Transit
- Timing the Starting Line
- Barging
- Touching the Pin while starting

- And optimal recovery techniques
- 2 hours during the Starting Sequence

At 1:00, the seminar broke for a lunch of hot meatball sandwiches, macaroni salad, chips, dessert. Following lunch, Jeff Stallings presented the Winston-Salem YMCA Adventure Sail Program, a partnership program with the YMCA of Northwest North Carolina, the Children's Home, and the Winston-Salem Recreation Department. In this program, children ages 6-13 learn to build and sail Optimist prams under the guidance and direction of people with extensive experience in boat construction and sailing. Specifically, the kids learn:

- To read plans
- To handle hand tools
- To work with wood
- To assemble all the parts of a boat
- To sand, paint and varnish a boat
- To install hardware and rig the boat
- To harness the wind and sail a boat
- To tie nautical knots and learn nautical terminology
- To race a boat against others!
