

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Wellesly Island State Park, Thousand Islands, NY July 18—25, 2015

Imagine beautifully clear water splashed with islands that have summer cottages and even some castles. Lots of green and blue, and spectacular multicolored sunsets. A place that makes you sigh with contentment and sheer pleasure. The Thousand Islands.

It's a thirteen hour drive from Greensboro, but worth every hour, even worth the occasional traffic jam. The Thousand



Islands area has that northern rocky ruggedness from tough winters and the genteelness of "summertime and the livin' is easy." Lush with pines, beautiful hardwoods, intriguing island homes, and a rocky shoreline, it's easy to fall in love with the area.

Twenty Wayfarers and one GP-14 from as far as Florida, Wisconsin, Michigan, and of course, North Carolina joined the many Canadian Wayfarers to cruise the St. Lawrence River. It was very interesting sailing in a current. One excursion took us through a narrow passage where a big tour boat honked at us to get out of the way. Headed downwind with the current made for tough maneuvering. Once through the narrows, we were headed into the wind and against the current. Some of us were sailing backward! Tacking a million times, it seemed like we were getting nowhere. The wind was shifty, sometimes strong, and occasionally it died right in the midst of us hiking to keep the boat flat.

The entire event was well organized, with morning meetings to discuss the cruise for the day. Many sailors were familiar with sailing the St. Lawrence and brought their charts. Each day was a different route around picturesque islands and through narrow passages where sometimes the paddles had to come out. We stopped at idyllic Canoe Point for lunch twice. You can camp here but you have to bring everything by boat. On Tuesday, at the park's brand new pavilion, the Wayfarers enjoyed a pig picking with wonderful food, but the "black tie" potluck event on Thursday was a feast to remember! You should've seen all the sumptuous food these campers brought! Amazing. What a beautiful place and a fun Wayfarer family!

The Windmill Junior Nationals were held on Thursday, July 23. Juniors 18 and under sail with an adult (usually the boat owner) as crew. This allows more boats to participate and provides an added level of safety. It also introduces juniors to the class. This year there were 8 boats entered, which is the most juniors in recent memory. Four races were sailed in 5-10 kt winds.

Avery Barrett and Gareth Ferguson from the RTP High School program both participated. Avery sailed with Larry Christian from New Hampshire. She finished 4th overall, but the highlight of her day was a 1st in the 3rd race. Gareth sailed with Alan Taylor as crew. Gareth posted an impressive 2-1-3-3 for First Overall. This was the first day sailing a Windmill for both of them.

The Windmill National Championship series consisted of 10 races over 3 days, Fri-Sun. Friday winds were 5-10 from the north, somewhat shifty, like lake sailing. Saturday was also northerly winds that dropped to drifting conditions. On Sunday a front moved through, bringing 10-20 knots from the south, making the series a good test of sailors' skills in all conditions. 25 boats competed. Ralph and Matt Sponar were the overall winners. Some of you met Ralph and Sandy at last year's HOT regatta. Alan and Gareth finished 11th overall, which Alan considers respectable in that very competitive fleet. Good fun was had by all.



A Spinnaker Primer

Dousing the Spinnaker

When you reach the leeward mark, it is time to douse the spinnaker.

There are two techniques to dousing. One technique is to bring the sail in to leeward, behind the main. This is referred to as a leeward douse. The other technique is the windward douse. In general, you want to end up with the spinnaker on the port side of the boat so it will be ready for the set at the next weather mark, so if you are coming into the mark on a starboard tack, do a leeward douse before you gybe around the mark. A more advanced maneuver is to gybe, then do a windward douse just before you head up to close hauled.

The first step is to raise the jib if it was lowered. Remember to lower the centerboard!

For a leeward douse, grab the sheet under the boom. Begin easing the guy. Gather as much of the foot of the spinnaker as you can. When you have most of the foot collected, call for the halyard to be released. The sail will be like a tube. Pull it into the boat as fast as possible, hopefully preventing it from ending up in the water. When the spinnaker is in the water your competitors will claim that you are "fishing." This is not a desirable thing for a racing sail-boat. Remember to bring the spinnaker on the correct side of the shrouds, depending on the particular class. Also, if you are on a Flying Scot, be careful not to tangle the spinnaker in the jib sheets. As soon as the halyard is released, or after the spinnaker is stowed if sailing with two crew, take the pole down and stow it. Get ready to gybe the main and trim the jib as you round the mark.

A more common technique is the windward douse. It goes like this. Raise the jib. Remove the pole from the mast and the guy. Option one at this point is to leave the pole hanging on the topping lift. Option two is to go ahead and stow the pole while the skipper or third crew keeps the spinnaker flying. Grab the guy. Release the sheet. Start gathering the foot of the sail. Call for the halyard release and begin pulling the sail down into the boat as fast as you can. Note that you don't have to have the entire foot of the spinnaker collected, but gather as much as you can.

If you time it right, the spinnaker will be stowed and you will be trimming the jib just as you round the leeward mark and head back to weather.
