ON THE LINE

December 8, 2012 was a lovely day for sailing in North Carolina. Not a single member of Race Committee would complain later about beautiful conditions in the 60's. The competitors enjoyed winds from the southwest ranging from 1.6 to 9 mps, with a pretty consistent average of around 6 mph.

But, when I rolled out at 0800, Earl Grey steam in an old cup brushed the whiskers of an early North Carolina fog that misted the soot from my old Urban Runner. The dirt rolled off PullsBot's silver hard body under a blistering 80 MPH highway apparent wind as I drove 40 miles to Lake Townsend. Steven Stills' *Southern Cross* was blowing out my speakers when I hit the entrance to the marina 30 minutes later, and my bladder was about to bust. My 1980 Catalina 22 *Magoodness* was still hunkered down at home undergoing repairs to the rudder, compass, and trailer. So, I was PRO. After a quick hello to our wonderful marina warden, and a closely located porcelain idol, I grabbed the RC boats radios and bolted to the committee boat.

Community yacht clubs like ours struggle to deliver community services for urban youths and citizens. Limited resources are always a challenge. But, the city of Greensboro, NC has been a blessing to our club. They provide us equipment storage, rental boats for training, and docks for races.

Still, we struggle for resources. LTYC manages to float an 18' pontoon boat for race committee (RC) and two SCAT boats. (By the way, does anybody know the sailing regatta meaning of the acronym SCAT? After a two hour online search, I give up.) Still that morning, I found a leaky gas line in the fuel oil soaked pontoon boat's engine area. So, Bill Byrd leaped into action and found duct tape to repair the leak. After other required safety checks, I towed

one SCAT and one RC boat to the launch. My smart blue ski suit soiled, we met before the competitor meeting to review safety procedures and ensure a prompt race start. Alan Taylor, LTYC Acting Commodore and Race Committee Director kicked off the competitor's meeting following filling, delicious breakfast delights provided by Wanda Williams.

The race committee performed superbly. The course was set for 16 competitors including 12 Flying Scots, 2 Wayfarers, a Lightning, and a Windmill, and the races began promptly at 1231 EST under average winds off the golf course averaging 4.9 MPH under glorious Carolina blue skies:

We were able to sail three races and return to the docks by 1530 EST ensuring plenty of time for social festivities before the lake gates closed at 1700. RC ran a quick first one lap race that lasted 22 minutes. The second race under very light conditions was conducted on a quickly (and expertly) shortened track for two laps that went from 1307 to 1336 despite winds that dropped to a low of 1.2 MPH. But, the racers were rewarded with *Continued on page 4*

an afternoon sun and breeze on a fresh course at 1345 for three laps, with gusts up over 9 MPH that took us to nearly 1500, our targeted exit time for the day. The skies were never more blue and we all had to shed winter clothing for vitamin D and dryness. Air temps approached mid 60's making even San Diego sailors jealous of the LTYC regatta. The races at the end were particularly close, providing excellent photo opportunities for RC.

District 27 proudly announces a program for the building and safe operation of a basic sailboat (Optimist Pram) for youngsters between the ages of 10 - 15.

This is a pilot program intended to serve as a model for a national USPS-supported program in the future.

Instructors will come from D/27. The North Carolina Maritime Museum has trained these instructors in the fundamentals of Optimist boat building, who now will supervise student participants in the construction and testing of their own sailing pram.



Three youth candidates from District 27 will be selected from a pool of applications received. Each candidate must be 10 - 15 years of age; able to swim; agree to participate in the entire program; complete and return the liability release form; have a parent, grandparent or guardian agree to participate in the program with the candidate; and provide means to transport the finished boat home. The boat becomes the property of the student participant upon successful completion of the program. There will be fundamental instruction on sailing the Optimist pram.

In addition, participants must agree to meet over four consecutive weekends for the construction, testing, classroom and training, supervised by instructors in Raleigh. Initially, there will be three groups in the program. The first group will meet from mid-March until mid-April; the second from mid-April until mid-May and the third from mid-May until mid-June.

During each session, the student and accompanying adult must successfully complete the ABC3 safe boating course if not previously completed. Upon successful completion the candidate will be given a free six-month membership in USPS.

A \$500 deposit is required for each participant team, which will be returned upon successful completion of the program. If the program is not completed, the deposit will not be returned.

Interested participants should prepare an application that can be submitted by mail or electronically. Applications must meet the previously listed criteria along with your name, address, telephone number, and email address. This application must be received not later than January 31, 2013 to the address or email listed below. Please include any boating experience for the student and/or the adult partner and any comments on why or how this program is important.

The qualifying participant groups will be selected at random and notified on or about mid-February, 2013.

Construction for the first team will begin on Friday, March 15, 2013. A liability release form will be required after the final selections are made.

An Optimist Pram is a flat-bottomed dinghy with a single sail, seven and one-half feet long and three feet eight inches wide. It is safe and simple to sail but exciting enough for a 15 year old.
