



Do You Want To?

We Always Have Skippers Looking for Crew.

It is OK if you are new to sailing. Our skippers are members of LTYC because they love sailing and they want to get others sailing too. They are not looking for experience or skill; rather, they are looking for someone who either loves to sail or wants to learn more about sailing. LTYC is a very friendly club that way.

Our Skippers Are Our Teachers.

Many of our skippers spend a lot of time teaching others to sail. Because of that, they are very familiar with having new sailors on their boats and teaching them the ropes, so to speak. When you first start to crew, you will likely work the jib sheets with ongoing instructions from the skipper. As you get more experience you'll start to do more on your own and you will start to do more sophisticated things, from calling the layline, to trimming the sails, flying a spinnaker, and being at the helm. Unlike other sailing clubs, after just a few days on the water with us, you will be a regular.

How to Get a Crew Spot.

There are several different things you can do to get a crew spot.

- 1) Ask me (Joleen) to add you to the Available to Crew list.
- 2) Sign up on a specific event scratch sheet under "Available to Crew."
- 3) Show up at an event at least 30 minutes prior to the Participants' Meeting.
- 4) Arriving late? That too works. Just let me know ahead of time that you plan to be there. I will line something up.

What to Bring and Do.

When you arrive at the lake, you will be noticed and will be asked if you are there to sail. If you don't own a PFD (lifejacket), you can get one from the marina. Sailing can be wet, so bring a change of clothes. Sometimes we actually sail in the rain (rain is OK, lightning is a no-go). Water repellent pants and a rain jacket are good starters. Plan to leave your keys and electronics on shore, or purchase a waterproof, floating dry box. Bring water, sunscreen, sunglasses and a snack to tide you over until the social gathering after the day's sailing. As you sail more, plan to pick up a pair of sailing gloves. Learn the basic sailing knots. If you are racing, you might want a watch with a count-down timer, and print out a copy of the signals. It won't take long before there is something you can do better than your skipper can do, or something you know more about than your skipper does.

Skipper and crew are co-participants at all our events. You get to help rig and launch the boat. After docking, you get to help put the boat away. Sailing on a small sailboat can be an active sport, so expect to get scraped, banged, even a bit bruised. There is a reason the boom is called the boom — be prepared to duck. Don't rush. Expect things to break. After sailing, there is usually a social gathering at the pavilion at the far end of dry docks, past all the sailboats. If you like, bring a small consumable treat to share.

Finishing was getting back into the marina. Ken Butler, who earlier had just randomly come by the lake, saw that it looked like fun – he went home and got his boat, got crew (Matt Stalnaker) and finished first! Uwe and Nancy came in second.

After putting everything away, we had something to eat, then drew envelopes from six bags. The envelopes held cards. Ken got a flush! Since he won both the Portsmouth race and the poker hand, he won the Fowl Regatta perpetual trophy (a paddle) and got his name burned into the blade. It was all a lot of fun. Eric Rasmussen donated the plaque that we put on the perpetual trophy, Tom Bews (and Dalton Cox) donated the paddle, and Uwe did the design for the trophy, two sea birds playing poker. Why I joined LTYC: After I took the beginning sailing class I needed to further refine my new skills and LTYC just seemed to be the perfect fit. It would be hard to find a friendlier group of people anywhere.

A Spinnaker Primer By Capt'n Al

The spinnaker is the large, colorful sail that is used to help sail faster downwind. LTYC has many boats that fly a spinnaker, including Flying Scot, Wayfarer and Lightning. The Tanzer class also allows a spinnaker, although most of the club boats do not currently have the rigging required.

This is the first of a series of articles intended to give the new sailor an overview of how to fly a spinnaker. New sailors at LTYC often get an opportunity to sail on a boat that is rigged for spinnaker. Hopefully after reading these articles you won't feel completely lost when you are on a boat flying a spinnaker.

Rigging

The first step is to rig the spinnaker before launching the boat. There are two sheets for a spinnaker. They typically are led to the aft corners of the boat, then forward under the deck to blocks amidships. While a spinnaker can be rigged on either side of the boat, I will focus on the most common method, rigging the sail on the port side.

The port sheet will be led from the aft corner of the boat forward to the shrouds. The starboard sheet will be led forward, outside the starboard shroud, around the headstay and back to the port shroud. The spinnaker halyard should be brought to the deck by the port shroud.

Before attaching the sheets, ask your skipper if he likes to set the spinnaker in front of or behind the shrouds. Be careful that both sheets are on the same side of the port shroud. If rigging a Flying Scot, then the port spinnaker sheet will run forward, outside the port shroud, then attach to the sail. If rigging a Lightning, the starboard sheet will continue aft from the bow, outside the port shroud, and then attach to the sail.

Like most sails, the spinnaker has three corners. It differs from a main or a jib in that it is symmetrical in shape. Therefore there is a head and two clews (this can be confusing at first). Attach the halyard to the head of the sail. Choose one side of the sail and trace down the tape (on the edge of the sail) until you reach a clew. Typically the tapes will be green and red, so trace the red tape to the port sheet and the green tape to the starboard sheet. It is important to trace the tapes to reduce the possibility that the sail will be tangled when it is raised. Attach the sheet to the clew, then return to the head of the sail and trace the other side. When you reach the clew, attach the sheet for that side. Stow the sail below the foredeck, or in the location that the skipper instructs.
