I joined the club in 2013. I grew up cruising on big boats on Lake Erie, but had not raced until I joined LTYC.


Equipment: Scott Bogue

Wayfarer South-East Down-East Cruise 2016 Solo Neuse Cruise Richard and Michele Johnson



For the past three vears we have tried to arrange a Wayfarer South-Down-East east Cruise. The first vear was a moderate success with one day of sailing due to the tail end of a storm. The next vear the camp-Sea ground at Level, NC was

just that or about 3" under to be exact. This year's weekend coincided with a regatta in the Mountains. We had small group who were interested and a high attrition rate. In the end it was Michele, my wife and co-conspirator, and the Black Skimmer, our boat. This year the planned trip was less ambitious. Sail from Blackbeard Sailing Club to Minnesott beach about 12 miles South East. Have lunch, then turn and sail 8 miles pretty much due west to Flanner's Beach and the Neuse River Recreation area. The following morning, we would sail just about due north to get home. We were not comfortable going alone, but staying home seemed less enticing. The weather was passable, with winds from the north-northeast at 10 to 15 swinging around to the southeast late on Saturday, with possible storms. On Sunday we would need to be up and out early. We had packed the boat to be capsized, just to be ready, we were using our cut down cruising sails, and we were prepared to turn back if anything did not feel right.

At 9:30 Michele stepped into the boat and we sailed quietly out of the Blackbeard Sailing Club. We rounded the seawall, turned south and ran down to the mouth of Broad Creek onto the

Neuse River. All in all, pretty simple. Wind was out of the north at 10 knots. There were hints it was going east. The sunlight shone through the gaps in the clouds. Our proper course was 135 to 140 so we made our turn to the southeast. Initially the GPS showed a 1:30pm arrival at Minnesott, it now showed 11:30am. Our speed varied between 5 and 7 knots.

It was pleasant. This was unexpected. So we said nothing. There hundreds of gulls ahead of us flying and floating. We had never seen that before, so we talked about that. We tried to catch the numbers on the marks, but we were never close enough. We would catch the next one. We couldn't identify bays or points of land but they sped past too fast to worry. We had lots of time. Minnesott was 11 miles away. There was a prominent point of land ahead. It was right on the compass course. It must be the last big point before Minnesott. A couple of puffs roughed us up, then the wind settled down and we were at Minnesott.

Minnesott beach faces the Northeast, the direction from which the wind was blowing. I would have gladly landed on Minnesott beach with someone else's boat, but was not willing to subject our boat to such a beating. We opted for a beach which is just adjacent to the Wayfarer Cove Marina near Minnesott beach. It looked quiet as we approached but the wind was sweeping waves down the oyster shell laden shore. Michele wanted to take a break and have a decent lunch. I wanted to hold the boat just off shore, eat standing up, and leave as soon as possible. Michele quipped that perhaps we should have just heaved-to on the water. She had a point. But we compromised on a small patch of soft beach down from where we landed. While eating I conjured up all sorts of dangers from roughed up gel coat to sand jamming the centerboard. It was a quiet lunch

Flanner's Beach was 8 miles to the west...ish dead downwind from Wayfarer Cove beach. We had regained our sense of humor (food has that effect on us) so we pushed off. I have never been fond of running. The boat always feels twitchy and last year we had a bad accident with a crash jibe, which nearly KO'd Michele. (That is another story...Michele kindly holds no grudge, but I am not sure she really remembers.) Given this, we jibed off and headed due south on a leisurely broad reach. When we were one-half mile from the south shore we jibed back for another leisurely broad reach. We were a little fuzzy on the exact location of Flanner's Beach but we could kind of see some heads bobbing in the water and people on the beach so we figured that might be it. We had covered the 8 miles, as the crow flies, in little over an hour despite two jibes which each took us about 20 degrees from the rhumb line.

We carefully approached the beach, luffed up parallel, and stepped off into knee deep water. We pulled the transom onto the shore. While Michele went to be sure we were at the Neuse River Recreation Park (none of the beach goers knew where they were) I un-lashed the CQR from the bottom of the thwart, attached the anchor line and pulled the boat off the beach. Michele confirmed we were where we thought we were. It was then we both realized we were stumbling exhausted. We pulled our personal stuff off the boat, rigged a stern line to the Danforth, made sure the bowline to the CQR was secure, and headed for the campsite. It took two trips to carry our gear up due to fatigue. It was the heat and humidity that combined to a heat index that approached 100. We hadn't noticed it while sailing. We went back to the beach to float in our life preservers to cool off. Water temps were in the 70s so the cooling off was limited. We wandered back to the tent for a nap, then dinner. Feeling more human, we took one last trip to check on the boat and watch the sunset. We had hoped to watch the full moon rise but staying awake took too much effort.

If you haven't slept on the ground in a while, it's hard and lumpy. Mostly just hard. We both woke before sun up and had a good laugh about how much we hurt. Pop Tarts and espresso breathed new life into us and we had all our gear on the beach by 7:20. Winds were NNE at about 5 to 10. The waves were soft, rounded, and regular. Once we had cleared the 300 yards of knee deep sand bar, Michele took the helm and sailed the final 5 mile beat home. It was a peaceful beat. Clouds were stacking up but shafts of sunlight gave the sky a cathedral feel. We were the only boat on the water. We sailed into Blackbeard Sailing Club as quietly as we had left. No one took any notice of us except that we were kind of in the way as an Ensign was being launched. We didn't say much, stripped the boat, washed her down, and tucked her into her dry slip.

This was our first overnight cruise and our first solo cruise. We both understand that solo is in general a bad idea, especially in a dinghy. But at some point you have to decide to go. I would like to think that our preparation, weather surveillance, and years of racing contributed to a safe trip. I am also aware that a pop-up storm could have turned us into a seagoing yard sale. Luck is always a component. I'm OK with being lucky.

Exploring the Changes in the 2017-2020 Rules by Dick Rose Try to say that 5 times fast! SAILING WORLD

Dick Rose, Chair of World Sailing's Racing Rules Work World Group, offers his insight in *Sailing World* magazine on the changes in the rules that go into effect in 2017:

Every four years, on New Year's Day of the year following the Olympic regatta, revised racing rules published by World Sailing take effect. This is the first of a series of articles covering important changes for 2017. I'll start by discussing what's new in Part 2, the rules that apply when boats meet. Most of the changes in the Part 2 rules are intended to simplify or clarify a rule and will not result in major game changes.

We start with two subtle changes that make Rule 21, Exoneration, easier to remember and fairer in many common situations. The rule was moved from Section C, "At Marks and Obstructions," to Section D, "Other Rules," and the words "under a rule of Section C" were deleted from it.

New Rule 21:


21 EXONERATION


When a boat is sailing within the *room* or *mark-room* to which she is entitled, she shall be exonerated if, in an incident with a boat required to give her that *room* or *mark-room*, (a) she breaks a rule of Section A, rule 15 or rule 16, or (b) she is compelled to break rule 31.

Revised Rule 21 will apply whenever a boat is "sailing within the *room* or *mark-room* to which she is entitled." In the 2013-2016 edition of the rulebook, Rule 21 applies only if the rule entitling a boat to *room* or *mark-room* is a rule of Section C. Two rules require a boat to give another boat *mark-room*: Rule 18.2 and Rule 18.3, both in Section C. Four rules require a boat to give another boat *room*: Rule 19.2(b) and Rule 20.2(c) in Section C, and Rule 15 and Rule 16.1 in Section B. The new rule is easier to remember because you enjoy the rule's protection when any rule entitles you to *room* or *mark-room*, regardless of where that rule is located in the rulebook.


