


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Pasta Salad Contest, July 8th








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

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40th Mayor's Cup

The 40th annual Mayor's Cup Regatta was held June 2nd thru the 4th. The festivities kicked off with a cookout Friday night – christening the new grills just installed by the city. With the light air, only a few sailors ventured out for the tune-up sail but everyone enjoyed the food (thanks to all members who brought a dish to share), the drink, and the company.

Saturday started with a continental breakfast as sailors from as far away as the coast ventured to Lake Townsend. After breakfast (special thanks to Wanda Williams for catering the entire event), Mayor Nancy Vaughn addressed competitors to welcome them to Greensboro's facilities. Thirtynine boats ventured onto the flat lake, where they waited patiently for the wind to show up. A few bailed out before the start, but after about a 90 minute wait the wind filled in from the NE. There were three starts: (1) The Open fleet and Tanzers (LTYC hosted their mid-Atlantic regional competition this weekend), (2) the Wayfarers (a fast growing fleet at LTYC), and (3) the Flying Scots. After some moving of the marks because of shifting wind, a second race was started, but it was soon abandoned after a 90 degree wind shift.

The forecast for Sunday was much better, but initial conditions were much like Saturday as sailors awaited the forecast 7-10 knots. To the surprise of everyone, after about an hour wait the wind filled in nicely from the SW. PRO Bill Jarvis and the RC did a great job setting a long WD1 course and got off two races before time expired. The three races comprised the Regatta for the weekend.

As the day drew to a close, Community Recreation Services Division Manager Phil Fleischmann spoke to the assembled crowd, congratulating LTYC on our 40th anniversary. Afterward, a tasty fried chicken dinner greeted the hungry competitors after a great day of Sunday racing.

Don Smith and Chris Kicinski took the Mayor's Cup with the best combined score among the Flying Scot fleet – proving that consistency is just as important as winning any given race (2nd, 3rd, and 3rd). LTYC was well represented by Robert Bouknight and Nancy Torkewitz taking 2nd place (5th, 2nd, 2nd). The Bryan Cup went to Bart and Janet Streb for the best Open fleet results (2nd, 1st, 2nd) in their Buccaneer. LTYC's own Alan and Stephanie Taylor took 2nd place (1st, 3rd, 4th) in the Open fleet in their Windmill.

In the Wayfarer fleet, Richard Johnson and Michele Parish were 1st (3rd, 1st, 3rd) followed by LTYC's Uwe Heine and Nancy Collins (1st, 6th, 2nd). In the Tanzers, Pete Thorn and Joe Schuch took 1st place (1st, 1st, 3rd) followed by Ken Whitt and Mike Maloney (2nd, 2nd, 4th). LTYC's Eric and Joleen Rasmussen took 3rd (5th, 3rd, 2nd).

The full race results were compiled and scored by Linda Heffernan and AnnMarie Covington and are posted on the website.

Thanks to the Race Committee and all the shore support for making the 40th annual Mayor's Cup a safe, competitive, and fun event for everyone. Thanks also to Michael Crouch for the event photography and to Annapolis Performance Sailing and Little River Sail and Canvas for their sponsorship!





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

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Life Vests / PFDs / Buoyancy Aids

Continuing our discussion of sailing fashion takes us to the ever-present Personal Flotation Device.

PFDs are a big part of being on the water (or they very well should be). Yes, they are sometimes hot, and sometimes they get in the way. *But*.

Wearing or not wearing a PFD isn't about how well you swim, it's about dealing with a boat that is capsized or turtled, being in the water for a long time, fighting the wind, and being fatigued when you take that unexpected plunge.

It doesn't work if you don't wear it, and it is a bit hard to put on while you are in the water, dealing with the lines, sails, and loose floating objects.

The first lesson I learned about PFDs was about adjusting the straps to get a good fit (and of course the vest should fit properly once adjusted. If it doesn't, it is the wrong one for you). I was helping to teach a class (did you know that teaching can include possible swimming?) A Capri


had gone over because the crew was

in the wrong place on an accidental tack. I didn't want to deal with a swamped or turtled Capri so I jumped in to hold the mast out of the water. The PFD floated up around my ears as I held up the Capri mast. It was uncomfortable and awkward but it was July and somewhat calm, so this time it wasn't a big deal. I was thinking about how it different it would have been under more difficult conditions.

So many designs are available that it can leave one confused. What type of PFD to choose? There are those great big orange ones that get caught on everything under the sun. There are the ones that inflate when wet, and the ones that look like a jacket with straps or a zipper.



If you plan on beaning your head or are out on heavy seas, you need to wear the Type I life vest,



There is that Orange Type II vest in the shed (the "Mae West"). Keeps the back cool, but tends to get caught on the dangly bits of line under the boom.

Most sailors prefer to wear a Type III PFD, the kind made for kayakers. They fit similar to a little vest. They are designed for calmer waters and the chance of a quick rescue.

Then there are the inflatables. While they are easy to wear in the heat and very comfortable, only activating



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when wet, they do have some problems. First, unless the inflating mechanism is fresh, the device may not inflate properly. When inflated, they blow up like big orange horse collars, not particularly great when you are trying to scramble out from under an overturned boat. And they might leak if they have been sitting around for some time, going flat when you most need them. A last concern is that as dinghy sailors we do expect that we could get wet, and those re-arm kits cost \$30 or

more.

Buoyancy Aids - As these are not Coast Guard approved, there may be restrictions regarding these. You will also need to check with your boat's class rules regarding wearing these.

Since they are not Coast Guard approved they do not meet the legal requirement for having a PFD on board for everyone.

You can read the debates on line about buoyancy aids. Since they don't have as much buoyancy as a PFD, it is better to wear these where help can quickly come, rather than out on the open water alone.

If the PFD you buy has various straps and pieces that get caught on the boom as you duck under, there are places that will sell you a nice cover. Or you could wear an old t-shirt. Or duck lower.

Periodically try out your PFD - To check the buoyancy of your current PFD, tilt your head back and relax your body. Your chin should be above water and your breathing should be easy. If your mouth is not above the water, you need a PFD with more buoyancy. It should also not ride up or go over your head. Remember, it will be different bouncing around in waves than it will be in calm waters.

Personally - I like bright colors. Not for the reason that it is just cheery but for visibility in and on the water. Wearing bright colors means a faster rescue, and reduces the chance of you getting run over.

PFDs get old. The foam in them deteriorates and the fabric loses its strength. Don't dig around in the floor-boards of your boat and bring out that really old moldy one. Break down and get one that will work when you need it.

And don't forget to buy a life vest for your critters if you take them on board.




