

It was a busy fall for the High School Sailing Team! In the space of six weeks starting on October 8, the team sailed in five regattas, with only one weekend off. We raced in the Club's final Monthly Summer Series in October, the South Atlantic Interscholastic Sailing Association North Points #1 Regatta (both of which were reported on in last month's Tell Tales), North Points #2, the HOT Regatta, and finally, the November Winter Series. We had 15 of our 16 team members race over this stretch of regattas.

Except for a team party at the Piedmont Winterfest skating ring in December, the team will take the winter off and start back with practice in March.

SAISA North Points #2

The High School Team raced Saturday, October 22, in the North Points #2 High School Regatta at Jordan Lake. It was an extremely competitive regatta. A total of 24 teams sailed, primarily from the Charleston, Wilmington and New Bern areas, and most were professionally coached. Nearly 150 sailors competed! We sent eight members, sailing two boats. Our boats finished 5th and 7th overall in the very competitive 11 team Composite Division.

Our top boat was Logan Hayes and James Lewis, who finished 2d in the Composite A Division.

HOT Regatta

The HOT Regatta was sailed over the final weekend in October, and the High School Team had six members race on Saturday and eight on Sunday. Saturday was challenging for some of our newer (and lighter!) skippers, with winds gusting into the teens. After a couple of capsizes, we sent the sailors in for dry clothes. Sunday was much better, with lighter winds and some of our heavier and more experienced members racing.

The competition was intense, but the team of Will Brady, Logan Hayes and Emma Jewel Autry took first place among the C420 fleet, and Elizabeth Davis and Preston Miller took second. The team loved racing for such a great cause!

November Club Series

The November Monthly Winter Series was our last regatta of the fall season, and our fifth regatta in 6 weeks! It was a beautiful day with perfect winds. We had 8 members racing on four C420s, and everyone wore their wetsuits. We were especially proud of team member Lilly Copplestone, who skippered in her first regatta. She sailed fantastic! Lilly has long been one of our best racing crews, and has recently started skippering.



Three Mainsail Trim Tips for Maximum Sail Power Captain John, Www.skippertips.com Captainjohnskippertips.com

If you are anything like me, sailing faster means you can get to an anchorage earlier than expected, reduce your exposure to foul weather, or beat the competition around the buoys on race night. Follow these three easy sailing tips today!

Draft Comes First

Keep the draft as close to the designed shape as possible. Remember that draft is the deepest part of a sail anywhere along its height. Your sailmaker creates mainsail draft to stay about 40% to 45% aft of the luff. When the wind fills in, the draft may creep aft. Follow these easy steps to keep the draft in place.

-- Tension the halyard with the winch or Cunningham until you just see a faint vertical crease begin to build along the edge of the luff.

-- Stop grinding or pulling. Next, ease the halyard in increments and watch the crease. Stop easing as soon as you see the crease disappear.



Think of your mainsail as the primary propulsion unit on your sailboat. How can you trim your main for maximum speed and power?

-- Cleat off the halyard and recoil the excess tail. Check and adjust draft often to reduce weather helm and keep your boat performing her best.

Install Leech Telltales

Imagine a skier on the bottom of a slope. They need to ski uphill to the top, then downhill to the other side, all the time maintaining contact with the ground. Air on the leeward side of a sail has to travel from the luff uphill to the maximum curvature of the sail, then to the leech, all the while maintaining contact with the sail surface. Follow these steps to use leech telltales to check the airflow:

-- Sew six to nine inch lengths of nylon ribbon or wool yarn to the end of each mainsail batten pocket.

-- Sail onto a close hauled (beating) point of sail. Set the boom in close to the centerline, but over-sheet the mainsail on purpose. Look along the edge of the leech. What do you see? All of your leech telltales will be hanging like limp noodles. That's because a stalled sail blocks the air flow.

-- Now, let's help the air stay attached to the sail from luff to leech. Ease the mainsheet in increments all the time watching the leech telltales. When all telltales are flying aft, cleat off the sheet. Your mainsail now has perfect sail trim!

"Listen" to the Helm

The wheel or tiller is the starting and ending point of trim and balance, whether you day sail, race or cruise. Each time you make a sail trim adjustment, test the helm. Can you steer the boat with just two fingers in any weather? Balance your boat so that you can achieve this objective.

When beating, you can tell whether you have good balance with a "hands off" test. Trim your sails for a close hauled course and steady up on the edge of the wind. Lift your hand off the wheel or tiller and watch the boat. A boat in balance will round up in a slow, smooth, easy motion toward the wind.

Start reefing earlier than you think you need to. Nine times out of ten, too much mainsail area causes balance problems. Reef the mainsail first. Then, adjust headsail area to balance the boat to perfection.

As singlehanded racing sailor and author Andrew Evans says: "To reduce weather helm, the singlehander should reduce sail behind the mast or increase sail in front of the mast."

Keep your boat driving with good speed and performance from your mainsail. Use easy sailing tips like these to sail safer on the waters of the world, wherever you choose to sail or cruise.



The rules provide integrity to competitive sailing and are an integral part of our sport. Sailboat racing relies on the rules to ensure that competitions are fair, consistent, and keeping sailors safe on the water.

The Racing Rules of Sailing is published every four years by World Sailing, the international authority for the sport. These rules, amended by U.S. "prescriptions," govern sailboat racing in the United States and in the portions of international races that pass through U.S. waters.

The Racing Rules of Sailing for 2021-2024 takes effect on January 1, 2021.

US Sailing has developed a NEW mobile-optimized Racing Rules App that includes the racing rules and other resources, including the ability to file a protest through the app, a whiteboard for diagramming boat-on-boat interactions, and an extensive resource library. The text of the rulebook is fully searchable and there is also a traditional index. Non-members can log into the app as a Guest and will be able to see limited content. US Sailing will continue to add more useful and innovative features to the app as they move forward.

In line with US Sailing's commitment to sustainability, the mobile app is available at no cost to all US Sailing members and is the primary distribution channel for The Racing Rules of Sailing for 2021-2024. Please note that US Sailing will not be automatically mailing copies of the printed rulebook to members in 2021. All members are entitled to purchase one printed rulebook for a flat fee of only \$7.00 and may order additional copies at the standard 25% member discount rate. The paper and waterproof versions of The Racing Rules of Sailing for 2021-2024 and the Sailor's Guide to the Racing Rules are now available for pre-order.


