# **Service Award**

# (Blue Jacket Award)

Established in 1997, the **Kent Taylor Team Trophy** was awarded to the fleet in the Mayor's Cup regatta with the lowest average overall Portsmouth score compared to other fleets. The idea was to support fleet improvement. This trophy was retired in 2005.

Alan Taylor notes that, besides his father's passion for sailing fairly and helping his fleet members improve, he was also very involved in service to the club, whether teaching sailing, serving on Race Committee, or leading a beach clean-up on a work day.

In 2013, the Taylor family re-purposed this perpetual trophy as the Kent Taylor Service Award.

Lake Townsend Yacht Club depends on the volunteer service to its membership. The Kent Taylor Service Award is given annually to recognize exceptional service to LTYC. Past recipients of the award, by secret agreement, shall choose the recipient(s) for the current year. The award is to be presented at the annual Change of Watch.

Traditionally, since 2013, the recipient has also received a "blue jacket" engraved with their name and the LTYC burgee. For his extraordinary work in the development and growth of the HSST, the 2022 winner of the Kent Taylor Service Award is:

It was great not to be hindered by COVID and to hold the event **LIVE** once again!



#### **Competitive Fun Sailing**

On the second Saturday of each month (March-October) we hold our regular LTYC race series. This is 'around the buoys' racing where courses are laid out and there is a Signal Boat (pontoon boat) which carries the Race Committee who administer the race. There are specific times set to attend an online competitors meeting prior to the race day and to have your boat at the starting area to race. Typically, there are three races run.

#### Social Fun Sailing

On the fourth weekend of each month (March-October) we have a Sailibration! There is no set time or agenda. This weekend is for daysailing and cruising just for fun. Club members are there who may either invite you to go sailing on their boat or give you advice about sailing your boat or a rental. Great opportunity to sail on different types of boats to see what suits you best. Good time to practice and improve your sailing or racing skills. Best way to learn is to be onboard with one of our experienced skippers.

## **Volunteers** Needed

#### Don't all jump at once... but don't be bashful either.

Last year, LTYC taught 13 teenagers and 53 adults to sail, improved the racing skills of 16 sailors, and gave 6 people their <u>very first sailing experience</u>.

Last year we put on 19 different events and positively impacted 88 different people, but to make all this happen, **volunteers are critical**. Both instructors and safety boat support staff are needed.

Besides the revenue this generates for Lake Townsend Yacht Club, these efforts go a long way toward promoting sailing and boating safety in our community.



Imagine sailing along the coast when all of a sudden, you lose steering. How can you use your sails alone to keep your boat on her sailing course? Follow these five easy steps to learn this little-known skill to give you 'the edge' in sailing and cruising safety.



If you lose steering you can sail under sails alone. Sail onto a close hauled or close reaching course. Aim for a distant object or use your steering compass (if coastal or offshore sailing). Slack the jib and trim the main to head up. Ease the main and trim the jib to fall off. See details below.

Steve Colgate, former Olympian, author, and founder of the Offshore Sailing Schools, tells a story about a race across the Atlantic ocean on a large sailing sloop. The rudder was damaged when they were still more than one thousand nautical miles from the closest harbor.

There they were, stuck out in the ocean with no rudder, and no spare parts to replace it. They steered their boat the rest of the way with just the mainsail and Genoa!

The crew were able to sail an accurate course day and night for more than a week and arrived safely at their destination. Follow the easy steps below to learn one of sailing's best-kept secrets.

#### Five Steps to Steer By Sails

**1.** Practice in an open area where you can sail on a close reach or close hauled course for at least one mile without worry about shoals or room. Pick a point in the distance to steer on that allows one of these points of sail. In this article, we will only be concerned with steering an approximate straight course.

**2.** Use your engine as necessary to help you hoist the mainsail and a small headsail (or partially furl the Genoa). Point the bow toward the distant object. Secure the engine. Lock the wheel or lash the tiller to center the rudder.

**3.** Try to maintain course within about ten to fifteen degrees on either side of the object. You can use a "fist width" to help you do this. Make a fist, extend your arm at about eye level. Place one edge of your fist along the forestay. One fist-width when you extend your arm straight out equals about 10 degrees.

**4.** Follow the path of the boat in the illustration from left to right. We begin with both sails trimmed for a close reach. Soon, we fall off the wind too far to the left. Ease the headsail sheet to luff the headsail. Keep the mainsail trimmed so that the boat heads up toward the wind. Just before you are back on course, trim the headsail just enough to stop the swing of the boat.

**5.** Next, you see that we are off course too far to the right, heading up toward the wind. Ease the mainsheet to luff the mainsail. Trim or backwind the headsail just enough to turn the bow away from the wind. Just before you are back on course, trim the mainsail just enough to stop the swing of the boat. Repeat steps 4 and 5 to continue this sail trim sequence.

#### Captain John's Sailing Tip

Make subtle changes when luffing the sails. Experiment to find what works best. After a few minutes, you will develop a rhythm and be able to play the sheets just right to keep the boat sailing a narrow "S" shaped course through the water. It gets easier with practice and patience. Both are key to success.


